

Wyoming Department of Education 21st Century Community Learning Centers Grant Fact Sheet

In 2015-16, over 8,100 students participated in 21st CCLC school year programs with 52% or 4,265 attending regularly (30+ days each year). Summer programs served over 7,000 students.

Program Purpose

21st CCLC out-of-school time programs (before and after school, summer, intersession, etc) must be designed to meet the statutory purpose of the 21st CCLC grant as well as the Wyoming 21CCLC Goals.

Wyoming 21st Century Community Learning Centers State Program Goals:

Goal 1: To establish community learning centers that help students in high-poverty, low-performing schools meet academic achievement standards;

Goal 2: to offer a broad array of high-quality enrichment activities that are aligned with and complement the regular academic school day while positively affecting student outcomes such as school attendance and academic performance and decreasing behavioral risk factors.

Goal 3: to provide programming to engage the families of 21st CLCLC participants for the purpose of increasing parent/family engagement in learning and developing resiliency through positive home/school relationships.

- Average subgrantee cost for both summer and school year programming: \$800-\$1000 /student
- Currently there are 4 active cohorts. Program grants are awarded for 5 years with the stipulation that funding is dependent upon a Federal award to the state and is thus not guaranteed.

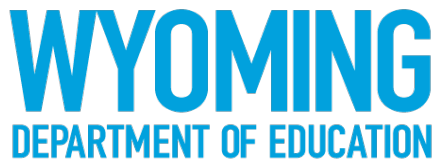

Current Subgrantees (as of May 2017)



- ❖ Active grants in 21 of 23 Wyoming counties.
- ❖ Twenty-eight (28) Subgrantees with thirty-seven (37) grants support eighty-seven (87) 21CCLC centers serving 8,100+ children.
- ❖ Grants range from \$94,075-\$200,000
- ❖ 53% of Subgrantees are school districts with community partnerships and 47% are community-based organizations, primarily non-profit, with school district partners.

2017 Cohort 12 Competition

With the Federal FY17 Title IV, Part B allocation made on July 1, 2017, the Wyoming Department of Education announced a cohort 12 competition to be held in 17-18 with an estimated award date of May 1, 2018. Approximately \$1.6 million dollars will be available for the Cohort 12 competition with continuing awards based upon the Federal budget allocations.

Eligibility

Types of applicants: Any public or private organization is eligible to apply for a 21st CCLC grant. (Ex. public schools/school districts, charter or private schools, community and faith-based organizations, and colleges/universities). All non-district applicants are encouraged to collaborate with an eligible school district that the participating children attend.

Current Subgrantees: Current 21st CCLC grantees may apply new funds to significantly enhance services, for expansion to additional sites or to serve a significant number of additional students.

*All applicants and Subgrantees must: 1) demonstrate that all the schools to be served within an application have a student population that has a free and reduced price lunch percentage at or above 25%, 2) demonstrate that at least 50% of served schools have a 40%+ free and reduced lunch eligibility rate *to receive priority for funding*, 3) implement the Principles of Effectiveness through continuous improvement processes in their program design and evaluation, and 4) design programs with youth outcomes in academics, behavior, and youth development.

Program Requirements

Subgrantees must offer programs during times when school is not in session (before and after school, summer, inter-sessions and teacher work days, etc). Programs must be designed to meet state and 21st CCCL objectives and GPRA measures, must incorporate strategies (with both academics and enrichment) that are best practice in youth development and based in relevant research, strive for inclusion of all students regardless of special needs, and have internal and external evaluation processes for continuous improvement that are data-driven. Programs should meet the unique needs of the community and students they serve while aligning with the work of the school day to enhance the effectiveness for students.
